Hello, my name is Mohammad Al-Jamal. I am currently a second-year law student who has a plethora of experience in sustaining a committee and ensuring the sustenance of a democratic environment. In my first year, I received training from renowned law firms, and in 2015, sat with a circuit judge in my area's district. As a second-year student, I am the General Secretary of the Mooting Society, and the Campus Ambassador for Aspiring Solicitors. My promise to the student body is to fulfil my role within the Democratic Procedures Committee to the best of my ability and to bring forth new ideas that I believe the Democratic Procedures Committee can benefit from, in light of the recent events that have happened this year.

AN ACCELERATED CLAIMS PROCEDURE - Firstly, as a member of the Democratic Procedure committee, I will petition to bring in an accelerated claims procedure. This is inspired by my studies of the Civil Procedure Rules we have within the United Kingdom to administer justice. Claims that fall within criteria - such as its nature (confined whether to a body manifesting the SU and its bylaws, or to an external third-party contractor), its urgency (whether it is an ongoing issue or a one-off incident), and its impact (if the motion to change a bylaw has such change that discussing it at an earlier time would be beneficial) - with such system implemented, the Committee would not only be able to review claims that are motioned for but per my second suggestion, would also be able to resolve issues before a formal motion should arise.

WE ARE HERE - Secondly, it is rather unfortunate for me to utter this, for we all know what has happened in the past few months regarding the motion to remove presidency and the inception of the Union Development Officer, following an executive decision. With respect to the DPC Chair, and all officers associated, what has been demonstrated is a total failure of communication. I petition to create an extricate chain of communication, with a review every month, between the organic bodies of the DPC, Elections Committee, and upon the suggestions of the Extraordinary Scrutiny Panel. This will also entail a campaign of awareness, advertising to our student-base our presence - that if any policy or bylaw is to be disputed against, then the DPC will take action and review the motion.

PRESENCE - Thirdly, as a matter of convenience, and to restore the confidence of our students within the democratic system of our governing principles - which had and shall always be free from an erring nature - we should move forwards to establish a presence within a University building.

Perhaps an office, with a box for suggestions of reform, or a room, such as an office for a titular society, would do us wonders. Our system of declaring motions through PDFs had proved systematically flawed - reviewing the submissions can prove to us that only those capable or experienced in a governmental-SU body petition for movements. Realistically, the DPC should be receiving more claims - and certainly not only exclusively from third and post-graduate students. Establishing an office presence would allow for motions to be filed by consultation. Inquiries would be received on day-to-day basis in order to fill up the agenda of the DPC. Though simplified PDFs have done amazingly well to better the submission of claims, the DPC should focus more on informal claims, for identifying the bylaws we must reform could be a secondary issue, while identifying the problem may be the primary. Insisting on students reviewing the bylaws, though generally advisable for understanding our organic body, might discourage many. Therefore, I petition to a system of simplified tolerance to claims revolving the general performance of democracy - undemocratic procedures should not be reported with the assistance of difficult identification of points of law, but through a flagging of the issue, for the DPC to deal, and investigate accordingly.

What do you think qualifies you for your chosen role?

I have a wide experience in scrutinising issues regarding bylaws, and contracts. I have trained intensively at a renowned international law firm - Baker McKenzie - and was responsible for regulating the compliance of contracts with legislative protocols, and ensuring bylaws of companies are compatible with mortgage agreements. I have much experience with the SU - being an Events Coordinator of Ancaster Hall in 2018/19, and General Secretary of the Mooting Society, along with my role as a Co-Chair of the Diversity Council. The DPC requires much dedication, and being involved in the SU so much already, I believe that it is time for my step forward. I also have witnessed the events that 2020 had for us in terms of the DPC, and the views of all officers involved. I have talked with Jacob Collier about issues with the DPC, and was able to identify weaknesses which I aimed to resolve in my manifesto. My dedication will also entail much time commitment to the DPC - my suggestions will certainly lead to an increase in reviews and motions - and this will require more meetings and commitment, and that commitment I will guarantee. Furthermore, I was able to talk with members of the previous 2018-2019 SU, such as Athena Postos who was the Chair of the SU, and how we should make it more accessible.
